## **ALVES**, James

Inverness bpt 27.IV.1737-27.XI.1808 Alves was awarded a gold medal in 1756 by the Society of Artists in Edinburgh, enabling him to travel. Between .X.1758 and .III.1765 he was a pupil at the Académie royale in Paris, under the protection of Vien. He was in Rome by 31.V.1765 when Boswell commissioned him to make a miniature copy of his portrait by Willison; Boswell gave Alves three sittings, and he was paid  $f_{.6}$  (Willison got  $f_{.15}$ ); the miniature was sent to Scotland via Lumisden and Strange (v. Katherine Read). In 1768 Alves appeared in Toulouse, exhibiting a portrait in the Salon from the address of Jean Francès, associé ordinaire de l'Académie de Toulouse, at the Pénitents noirs. Two years later he showed four miniatures.

He seems to have been back in Scotland in 1773, when Boswell, accompanied by Dr Johnson, visited Inverness castle. A few year later, he was in London, exhibiting pastels at the Royal Academy (from Mr King's, New Bond Street, 1777; King Street, Covent Garden, 1778; 26 Maddox Street, 1779). In .IV.1778 he made portraits of the children of "Mr Nicholay" (that of William was already on exhibition in Pall Mall, while Edward required another sitting; their father was Frederick de Nicolay (1728-1809), a German musician, principal page to Queen Charlotte from 1762, and her music librarian; he married Albinia Lattman in 1759); in Bath, on 25.x.1778, he played whist (badly) with the lawyer John Baker, who described hims as "écossais, fort petit, was 8 years at Rome...turned Roman Catholique à Rome and great bigot, pas trop sensé." Later he settled in Scotland where some of his works, signed JA, survived. "His life was singularly good, recluse, and inoffensive, and his death much regretted. He went abroad when young to improve himself in the fine arts, and studied eight years in Paris, and other eight years in Rome" according to the Inverness journal, 16.XII.1808.
