BALECHOU, Jean-Joseph

Arles 11.VII.1715 – Avignon 8.VIII.1764 After initially studying painting in Avignon alongside Joseph Vernet (he is also claimed as a pupil of Vialy), Balechou (or Baléchou) turned to engraving, which he learned from the Avignon engraver Michel. In 1734 he joined Lépicié in Paris, and subsequently devoted himself to reproductive engraving after portrait painters such as Rigaud and genre painters such as Jeaurat. He was agréé in 1749 with his celebrated plate of August III., but a dispute over secretly retained copies damaged his standing, and he was never reçu. He returned to Avignon in 1753. In 1763 the Dutch scholar and collector Joan Gideon Loten was in Avignon, where, on 8.IX.1763, he called on "Mr Balechow" who was not at home. However his wife showed Loten "an apartment where I saw several of his prints...pleasantly done in pastel & opposite to it the same print."

Nothing more is known of his work as a pastellist apart from the single work of his youth indicated by Belleudy. There seems no strong reason to question the inscription Belleudy reports, although the Institut Calvet website omits any mention of this and reproduces the pastel as an anonymous portrait of Balechou.
