BERAIN, Jean-Baptiste III

Paris 1724 – La Rochelle 1789 The youngest child of Jean II Berain and Madeleine Hérault, he was two years old when his father died. In 1740 he was sent to Dresden where he worked under his uncle Louis de Silvestre for several years; despite a pension of 200 thalers, he proved to be too young to be of great help. By 1749 he was in Rome, returning to France around 1750. In 1756 he left Paris for Châlons. In the same year his daughter (q.v.) was born illegitimately; he married the mother, Louise-Jeanne-Gabrielle de Longagne, in 1763. By 1769 they had moved to La Rochelle, where two years later he made the pastels of a négociant and his wife. The following year he made the portraits of their daughter and brother; the signature on these, in magnificent writing, seems to be Berrain.


