BOULTON, Matthew Robinson

Soho, Birmingham 8.VIII.1770 – West Bromwich 16.V.1842

Matthew Robinson Boulton was the son of the eminent scientist and engineer, Matthew Boulton, who was very familiar with the medium of pastel: as early as 1771, he was engaged by Erasmus Darwin (q.v.) to provide him with crayons; several years later he commissioned a portrait of his son from Liotard, and the boy's education in France included drawing lessons with "large heads in Crayons" (letter to his father, 20.III.1787). In 1800 he became a partner of James Watt, Jr (who had been similarly educated, and made ornamental drawings) taking over the Soho foundry established by their fathers. Said to be "an example of how a great talent, judiciously directed, can amass a great fortune", he left some f,1.5 million at his death.
