DELAPERCHE, Jean-Marie

Orléans 22.III.1771 - Paris 29.XII.1843 "Jean Marie Laperche" enrolled as an élève in the école de l'Académie royale in Paris on 30.I.1788, aged 17, initially under Suvée but from IX.1788 as a pupil of David; he exhibited portraits at the Salons from 1824 to 1842. According to the registres d'état-civil (Paris, XIIe arrondissement), he died 29.XII.1843 in his home, 37 rue des Postes, and was married to Cécile de Serigny. He is known to have spent time in Russia; the maréchal de Castellane (Journal, 7.X.1812) took on as interpreter the artist's 15-year-old son Stanislas, who already spoke Russian, Polish and German, and mentions that the family, with three children, were struggling to survive at the time of the French entry to Moscow.

His work has been confused with that of his younger brother Constant Delaperche (who had been précepteur to the Chabot children, cousins of Castellane), and also with that of the pastellist Mme Laperche (*q.v.*), his mother, to whom the 18th century pastels previously given to him are provisionally here reassigned (some date to the early 1780s).
