DEZALLIER D'ARGENVILLE, Antoine-Joseph

Paris 1.VII.1680-29.XI.1765

Secrétaire du roi, celebrated naturalist, connoisseur and collector. His influential Abrégé de la vie des plus fameux peintres appeared in four volumes, 1745-52; its technical analysis, particularly of drawings, drew on his own extensive collection. A second edition, 1761-62, included a life of Rosalba based on information supplied, among others, by Jean-François Séguier 1752. Dezallier's own letters to Séguier include important information on the cost of pastels and mention his own (occasional) use of pastel (v. Treatises). His collection was dispersed in two sales (1766 and 1779, following his widow's death). His son Antoine-Nicolas (1723-1796), also a magistrate, was the author of the Voyage pittoresque de Paris (1749) and des environs de Paris (1755), of several gardening treatises, and of an extension of his father's work, the Vies des dameux architectes et sculpteurs... (1787).
