DIXON, John

Dublin c.1740 – London .XII.1811 Engraver; trained at the Dublin Society school. He moved to London around 1765 after, it is said, dissipating a small patrimony. Many of his prints were after Reynolds. He became a director of the Free Society in 1773 but gave up engraving when he married a rich widow in 1775. Walpole described his last exhibit, the 1st Duke of Leinster after Reynolds, as "a masterpiece of Art which has never been excelled". He should not be confused with Lely's pupil, Matthew Dixon (*q.v.*).
