DODD, Daniel

fl. London 1752–80

Miniaturist, engraver, book illustrator in various media and occasional pastellist, he exhibited numerous portraits in crayons and, particularly in later years, oil. Virtually all of these are lost, and nothing is known about his origins (he may perhaps have been related to the theatrical family: many of his illustrations were theatrical). The earliest mention is his advertisement in the *Daily advertiser*, 28.XI.1752 of an etching “in the manner of Rembrandt” of the musician Richard Leveridge after Thomas Frye; one may surmise that he was a pupil of Frye, although the technique is quite different from Frye’s mezzotints. He was represented at the Free Society between 1761 and 1780 (in 1763, from Old Ford near Bow; in 1767, Portland Row; in 1770, 43 Great Portland Street; in 1773, 3 Old Bailey; in 1778 (“Dodd, portrait painter in oil, No. 3 in the Old Bailey”, in Kearsley’s *Pocket Ledger* for 1778), 25 Ludgate Street; and in 1780, 2 Ludgate Hill) and at the Society of Artists in 1772 (from 33 Leadenhall Street) and 1780.

He may be the Daniel Dodd recorded as a rate payer in Red Cross Court, Tower, in 1734 and the Petty Wales Precinct of the Tower from 1739, but that could be the Daniel Dodd buried in 1751 in Whitechapel, possibly the artist’s father. By 1751 he was in Frith Street, but an entry in the Westminster rate books for Bow Street in 1773 indicates that Daniel Dodd had lived there, but the property was empty.

Daniel Dodd married a Rebecca Potter, both of the parish of St Mary’s Whitechapel, on 27.VII.1752 (clandestine May Fair registers). The Master Dodd (*q.v.*) and Miss Dodd who exhibited at the Free Society in 1769 were his children and his pupils (Schidlof thought that D. P. Dodd was probably a brother). The latter may have been the Rebecca Dodd baptised at St Mary, Stratford Bow, 1.IV.1759, or an older, unrecorded sister. Among his other pupils was a John Smart (*q.v.*), a homonym of the miniaturist).

Among the more curious of his portraits was that of Mrs Rudd, implicated in a notorious forgery trial, made by Dodd at the time of her trial. The 1767 critique confirms that his portrait of Garrick between Tragedy and Comedy was a copy, no doubt after Reynolds.

His miniatures are signed “DD”, leading to confusion with those of Diana Dietz.

Although there are a number of homonyms, it is possible that the artist was the Daniel Dodd buried at St Mary Magdalen, Old Fish Street, on 28.IX.1797; a Rebecca Dodd was buried there 9.VI.1793.

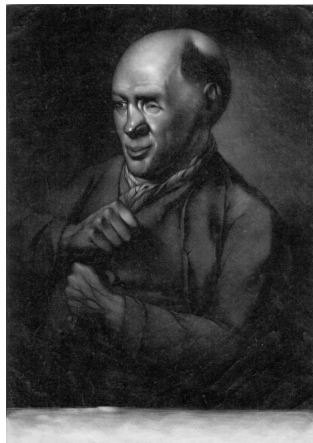

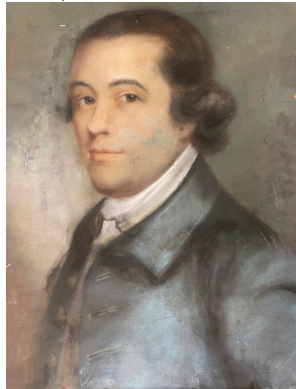
