DUCREUX, Rose-Adélaïde, Mme de François-Jacques Lequoy de Montgiraud

Paris 29.VIII.1761 – Saint-Domingue 22 or 26.VII.1802

Joseph Ducreux's eldest daughter and his pupil, best known as a miniaturist. As a child she was portrayed by Greuze holding the dog of the lawyer Gerbier; the picture fetched Fr1095 in the Gendron sale, far exceeding her father's own works. Her Autoportrait of 1785 (praised by Pahin de La Blancherie) seems to be one of her few pastels; some oil paintings were also exhibited at the Salons from 1793, where they attracted favourable criticism, and were even praised above her father's work. She married François-Jacques Lequoy de Montgiraud (1748-1804), préfet colonial de Saint-Domingue; she acccompanied him to Saint-Domingue, departing from Brest 16.II.1802 and marrying Montgiraud on board the Zélé on 1.IV.1802; five months later she died there, of yellow fever.
