DYKE, Richard William

fl. Ireland 1787–1819

Richard William Dyke studied in the Dublin Society schools from 1787, winning medals for drawing in 1788 and 1789. He married a Rosetta Toole at St Mary's, Dublin, 13.XI.1791, described as a miniature painter of the City of Dublin. He then worked in Belfast, making "striking likenesses in crayons and watercolours at a guinea apiece" and teaching figure, landscape and flower drawing. He also ran a music shop and taught the flute. He appears in Joseph Smith's Belfast directory for 1808 as a "crayon and miniature painter, and drawing master", at 64 Mill Street (1807 edition), 75 Mill Street (1808); the former address appears on the engraving he made of his own portrait of Fr O'Donnell. He was still recorded as a music teacher and freeholder in Mill Street in 1835 (unlesss this is a confusion with a homonymous son, 1805-1879), although he was also recorded in Dublin as a miniaturist, exhibiting at the Hibernian Society of Artists in 1815 from 14 Crampton Court.
