HOWARD, Hugh

Dublin 1675 – London 1738

Irish portrait painter and collector. The family emigrated to England in 1688. In 1697 Howard travelled to Rijswijk with the British ambassador to the peace conference, the Earl of Pembroke. He went on to Rome, where he studied under Carlo Maratti (*q.v.*). On his return to London in 1700 he practised portrait painting and attended Kneller's academy which opened in 1711. He abandoned art around 1714, when he married Thomasina Langston (–1728), the wealthy daughter of a general; there were no children. He also acted as an art adviser to the Duke of Devonshire. In 1726 he was appointed paymaster-general of the royal works, a lucrative sinecure. He assembled an important collection including old master drawings by Dürer and Michelangelo. Some of his extensive collection of British drawings descended from his brother Dr Robert Howard (1683–1740), Bishop of Elphin, to the Earls of Wicklow; they were purchased by the British Museum in 1874 from the 5th Earl.
