HURTER, Johann Heinrich von

Schaffhausen 1734 – Düsseldorf 1799

Miniaturist and enamelist. He was in Bern 1768–70, and in Paris before 1776. In that year he published a curious *Prosepectus d'un plan de souscription pour une exécution en émail d'un nouveau genre...* which he had printed in The Hague and distributed to wealthy connoisseurs. That sent to the marquis de Paulmy was reprinted in the *Revue universelle des arts* (XI, 1860, pp. 105ff). Hurter's *avant-propos* begins by stating that he had occupied several years in The Hague making portraits in enamel and pastel.

Hurter then spent five years in London from c.1777. Here he was taken up by Lord Dartrey, and copied the works of Sir Joshua Reynolds. In 1779 he exhibited three pastels as well as two enamels from an address in Covent Garden. Two further pastels, dated 1781 and 1786, are known, but otherwise his work is in enamel or miniature. Between 1785 and 1787 he travelled to Schaffhausen, Karlsruhe, The Hague and Paris before returning to London; he continued to spend time in both London and Germany. He received a major commission from Catherine II of Russia in 1787.
