HUTCHISSON, Joseph

Dublin 1747 – Bath brd 5.IX.1830

Hutchison, Hutchisson, or Hutchinson is identified by Foskett as Joseph Hutchison of Bath. He trained at the Dublin Society schools from 1764, and was apprenticed to G. Carneross, an heraldic painter. He went to London c.1790, made portrait and animal pictures in oil and crayon, and exhibited miniatures at the Royal Academy 1792-1819 from various addresses. He was in Bath from 1795, recorded at 1 Westgate Buildings, next to Thomas Beach, 1799-1804, and thereafter at various addresses until his death in 1830; his last residence was in St James's Parade, and he was buried at St James's, Bath. A brief obituary notice appeared in the press (e.g. Oxford journal, 4.IX.1830: "upwards of 40 years an eminent portrait painter in Bath"). It is possible he was the Joseph Hutchisson who married a Mary Bolar in St Webergh's, Dublin, 11.VI.1785. It has been suggested that he was the father of the painter William Henry Florio Hutchisson, who was born in Dublin c.1806 according to his 1851 census entry, and active in India 1824-42.

An oil portrait of the composer, singer and director of Bath Concerts, Venanzio Rauzzini, is in the Pump Room (Hutchison's print was advertised in the Bath chronicle, 15.V.1800), and several other oils are in Bath museums. By 12.I.1804 (Bath chronicle) he was described as "portrait and animal painter to THR the Duke and Duchess of York", mentioning another portrait of HRH accompanied by a dog which had been presented to the Corporation; in 1808 he received 10 gns for it. Several versions of the portrait of the Duchess of York with a Dalmatian are known, the pastel distinctly better than the oil. Numerous advertisements in the Bath press offer lessons, and aslo "exquisite prepared paper, for Crayons." In the Morning post, 27.vi.1811, he was described as "Crayon painter" to TRH the Duke and Duchess of York. A letter of 15.IX.1821 (National Archives) applies for permission to paint portraits of the king to be presented to the cities of Dublin and

A different Joseph Hutchison entered the Royal Academy Schools in 1795 aged 34.
