HAMILTON, Gustavus

Co. Meath, Ireland 1739 – Dublin 1775
Miniaturist and still-life painter in gouache. The younger son of a clergyman, he was a pupil of Robert West at the Royal Dublin school; he was also an apprentice of Samuel Dixon in Dublin, where he coloured prints of birds and flowers. He became a miniaturist, with a fashionable clientèle and a technique notable for his blue-tinted faces. Only one pastel is possibly attributed to him, but the basis for this is unclear; Sée commented in the 1927 catalogue entry for a misattributed pastel (by Sharples), that "Gustave Hamilton should be watched by the judicious collector, as later on more of is work will be unearthed and he is a coming man."
