HAMILTON, William London bpt 23.VI.1751–2.XII.1801

Hamilton's father, also William, was an assistant to Robert Adam; the architect took the young painter with him to Italy, where he studied under Antonio Zucchi but "was too young to receive any material benefit from [the trip]". ("Monzu Hamilton - studente inglese - 15" was recorded in the Piazza Mignanelli in 1767.) Back in London in 1768, he was admitted to the Royal Academy Schools on 14.II.1769. He exhibited portraits and other paintings at the Royal Academy from 1774, becoming an associate in 1784 and a full RA in 1789. He worked on book illustration for Boydell's Shakespeare Gallery, and between 1780 and 1792 he specialised in theatrical portraits and scene painting (Drury Lane, Covent Garden etc.)

On 25.x.1779, at St George's Hanover Square, he married Mary (c.1762–1837), the daughter of Captain Peter Aylward. The couple befriended Thomas Lawrence (q.n.) on his arrival in London from Bath; he made pastels of the couple in 1788, and the following year a chalk drawing of Mary now in the Britsh Museum. Hamilton's sister was Maria, Lady Bell (q.n.).

From 1782 Hamilton's studio was in Dean Street, Soho (nos. 61 and 63 are cited in various sources, although the Survey of London records him as the rate-paying occupant of no. 83 from 1784 to his death). His portrait by George Dance (1793) is in the Royal Academy, as is Singleton's group portrait of the Royal Academicians in which he is included. After Hamilton's premature death, his widow wrote to the Royal Academy (15.III.1802) requesting to be placed on the list of those eligible to receive assistance from the charity fund, adding (24.VII.1802) a statement of means corroborated by John Flaxman and Thomas Lawrence. Three year later, she was remarried, to John Charles Denham (1777-1867), secretary of the Globe insurance Company and an amateur artist; his mother was the miniaturist Mrs Denham.

William Hamilton's pastels are said to be similar to the portraits of Romney, worked in a broad and slick style; but few have survived, and it is difficult to assess the accuracy of records that may refer to chalk drawings or to pastels by Hugh Douglas Hamilton – or overpromotions by the dealers of the day.
