JOHNSTON, John Boston 1753–1818

Portraitist of American Revolutionary figures; worked in oil and pastel. Born into a family of artists, his father was Thomas Johnston (*q.v.*). John Johnston's career as a painter was interrupted during the American revolution: he joined an artillery regiment in .IV.1775, and the following year was commissioned as a captainlieutenant under General Knox. He was wounded and captured by the British in .VIII.1776, but released and dischargeed the following year, when he returned to Boston and resumed painting. He was a founding member of the Massachusetts Society of the Cincinnati.
