KARPFF, Jean-Jacques, dit Casimir

Colmar 12.II.1770 – Versailles 24.III.1829 Also Karpf, Carp etc. The son of another Jean-Jacques and Marie-Madeleine Schindolff, he studied in Colmar before enrolling in the Paris Académie school on 28.VI.1789 as a pupil of David, living in the Luxembourg chez M. de Narbonne and recorded there until .IX.1791. In 1795 he returned to Colmar as drawings teacher at the École centrale. He was back in Paris in 1805 and became known as a history and portrait painter, miniaturist (he was particularly known for his miniatures en grisaille), draughtsman and lithographer. His portrait of the impératrice Joséphine received a gold medal at the salon de 1808. As the livret to the 1817 salon suggests, he divided his time between Paris (17 quai Voltaire) and Versailles (89 Avenue de Saint-Cloud). Around 1806 he formed a relationship with the poet Marguerite-Victoire Babois (1760-1839), niece of Jean-François Ducis; they are buried together in Père Lachaise.
