MILLET, Joseph-François, dit Francisque

La Fère 26.VI.1699 – Versailles 16.VI.1777
Contrary to all sources hitherto (2021), Joseph Millet Francisque was the cousin, not the son, of the landscape painter Jean Francisque Millet (c.1666–1723), although he may well have been his pupil. Confirmed by his age at death he was born in 1699, not 1697, to Pierre-Antoine Francisque Milet “peintre” (probably the Pierre Millé, peintre who in 1679 attended the funeral of François Millé Francisque, who died aged 36, the father of Jean Francisque Millet) and Marie-Anne Dufresne; his godparents were Armand-Charles de La Porte, duc de Mazarin (1632–1713) and Hélène-Albertine Le Picart, baronne de Bousies.

Joseph Millet Francisque was agréé 1733 as a landscape painter, *reçu* 1734; he became maître à dessiner des pages de la reine. His life seems to have been spent at Versailles, largely among musicians, a number of whose mariages he witnessed. He was married twice: first, at Versailles, Notre-Dame, on 11.V.1739, to Marie-Anne Ruffet (aged 29), the mother of his two daughters; and secondly, at Versailles, Saint-Louis, on 26.XI.1754, Madeleine Maniclerc (aged 49, 5 years his junior): a witness was Claude Francisque, garde-chasse, his brother. On his burial entry (Versailles, Saint Louis), he was described as “Joseph Millet Francisque...écuyer, peintre de l’Académie royale de peinture et sculpture”, aged 78; it was witnessed by his two sons-in-law, Jean-Charles Riqueur and Jean-Sébastien Piercourt – the latter was an ordinaire de la musique du roi whose wife had died a few months earlier.

He occasionally used pastel for portraits, all of which are now lost with the exception of an apparently signed work known only from a 1912 reproduction which is too poor to assess (but looks like a later pastiche). Diderot dismissed him rapidly, in 1765 and 1769 – “Pont Notre-Dame” is a pejorative term reserved for the “croutés” sold in the boutiques there in the eighteenth century (*v.* Michel 2007) – although for Mariette, the Poussin-influenced “...paysages de ce peintre son fort estimés; ...tout y est riant.” Laing (in Boucher 1986, p. 60) numbers him among the “uninspired exponents of the fag end of the Claudian and Poussinian traditions.”
