MUSSON, Pierre

Orléans 1739– Paris p.1799?

A pastellist and miniaturist, he exhibited a case of miniatures at the Salon of 1799. He was more celebrated as a hoaxer and female impersonator than as an artist, according to the *Mémoires secrets* and a number of other sources; among his victims were Isabey, the princesse Dolgorouky and général Thiébault. He died in a traffic accident in the rue de la Chaussée-d'Antin (then named rue du Mont-Blanc). Herluison praised the several works that were exhibited in the Orléans retrospective: “on a remarqué de ravissants portraits (miniatures et pastels), dus à son pinceau délicat, tous d'un faire charmant, d'un nacré suave et sans doute d'une grande exactitude de ressemblance”. There are confusions with his father, the clockmaker Pierre Musson (maître 1746, died c.1780) as well as with the pastellist's younger brother Pierre-Salomon, a pupil of David and Brenet at the Académie from 1784, when he was staying with his brother in the rue Montmartre.
