PEALE, Charles Willson

St Paul, Maryland 15.IV.1741 – Philadelphia

22.п.1827 Prolific portraitist in oil and miniature (as well as saddler, jeweller and cabinet maker); he is recorded in Annapolis studying with the portraitist Johan Hesselius, and is also said to have been a pupil of Copley from 1765. In 1766 he travelled to London to study with Benjamin West; here one of his purchases was a set of crayons. He was back in America by 1769, dividing the next seven years between Annapolis and Williamsburg. He served as a soldier under Washington (of whom he made numerous portraits) in the revolution. He was based in Philadelphia after 1776, devoting himself after 1782 to his museum. His brother St George Peale and son Rembrandt (qq.v.) were also pastellists.
