PLOWMAN, Frederick Prussia

Dublin 1759–1820

Portraitist; worked in Dublin and Limerick. He first appeared in 1773 when he sent copies after Rosalba (medium unknown, but quite possibly pastel) to the exhibition in George's Lane, Dublin organised by a group of artists in competition with the Society of Artists of Ireland. He was then at the Dublin Society school, and his address was given as 1 Winetavern Street. A Frederic Plowman was admitted to the Royal Academy Schools on 6.X.1780, aged "21 next Nov", the only evidence of his birth, but near enough the 27.X.1756 on which a Frederick Plowman was baptised at St John's, Dublin, to Joseph and Jane, née Dobbins (however there was at least one homonym, a woollen draper). In 1781 he presented to the Dublin Society several copies of paintings executed under the supervision of Sir Joshua Reynolds. Around 1808 he visited Limerick, painting several portraits and religious pieces for the Franciscan church in Henry Street. He died at the Crescent, Marino, Dublin. An oil portrait in the manner of Hugh Douglas Hamilton is the only surviving work. Although Strickland says he worked in crayons, there is no firm record of his use of the medium.
