PIC, Jacques-François-Claude

Nevers 24.II.1744 – Sedan 11.II.1812

M. Pic, peintre advertised in the *Affiches de Lyon*,
27.VI.1765, p. 106–

Une grande Tenture de Tapisserie peinte sur Toile,
d'une très-belle hauteur, à vendre. Elle est neuve & à
pavot des Indes, rehaussée en or & argent: s'adresser
chez M. Pic, Peintre, rue du Bois, au coin de la rue de
l'Aumône, à côté de M. Morel, Notaire, au troisième étage.
Le sieur Pic offre ses services au Public pour ce qui
regarde l'art de la Peinture, tant en Tapisserie qu'en
autres genres.

He had previously advertised as a “Peintre dans
le genre des tapisseries de toutes especes” in the
same journal, 30.V.1764, p. 92. Again on
8.II.1769, p. 29, “Le Sieur Pic offre ses services
au Public, pour ce qui concerne le lavis de la
Peinture. Il nettoie les Tapisseries de hautes-
lisses &c.” He is evidently the same as the
pastellist who advertised in the *Annonces, affiches,
nouvelles et avis divers de l'Orléanais* of 4.IV.1780—

Le Sr. Pic, Artiste pensionné du Roi, offre ses
services pour ce qui concerne l'Art de la Peinture,
portraits à l'huile, au pastel & en mignature; il peint
aussi des robes & garnitures de robes dans le dernier
goût, fait revivre les couleurs des anciennes
tapisseries, soit en soie, ou en laine, ou étoffe d'or &
argent. Sa demeure est chez le Sr. Darquet, Tailleur, rue des
Fauchets.

It seems very likely that he was the Jacques-
François-Claude Pic, artiste-peintre, son of
Claude Pic, and Eugénie Grignon, who married,
23.IV.1765 (when still a minor), at Saint-Nizier,
Lyon, a Claudine Vincent (1739–), daughter of
a tisserand.

A little more is known about his father,
Claude Pic, peintre de l'Académie de Saint-Luc,
Paris. He was born in Orléans in 1716
(according to his carte de sûreté, issued
11.VI.1793, when he was living at 13 boulevard
du Temple; he had moved to Paris in 1750), and
married Eugénie Grignon in Varzy, Nièvre,
21.IV.1738. He was living in Nevers in 1748,
described as “peintre doreur” in court papers;
several children were baptised there to 1744.
Claude Pic, peintre, was living in Paris,
boulevard du Temple when he was listed as a
creditor of another painter, Michel Thomas Le
Gros (17.V.1765), making it less likely that he
rather than his son was the pastellist advertising
in Lyon a month later. When he died in
Gentilly, 10.VII.1799, aged 82, he was described
as a peintre et décorateur, married to Justine-
Thérèse-Colette Meurice, whom he had married
in Paris, 3.V.1788, natif of Dun-Le-Roi, Cher,
where he was born 29.XII.1717.
