### **POUPARD, Jean**

Jl Longué 1668–72

Joseph Grandet (1646–1724), in his notice on the miracle of Les Ulmes (*Dissertation apologétique*, 1715), identified Poupart as the local painter who made the “crayon au pastel de la figure de l’apparition qui fut gravé par ordre de la duchesse de Longueville.” The miracle took place in 1668: a Christ-like figure appeared for about a quarter of an hour over the altar of the church. It was investigated by Henry Arnauld, the Jansenist bishop of Angers. The pastel was commissioned by André Lanier, curé de la Trinité d’Angers, and sent to Paris where the duchesse de Longueville had it engraved. Although ignored in the extensive religious literature surrounding the miracle, the artist’s existence is confirmed by the appearance of “honorable homme Jean Poupart, peintre” as parrain at a baptism on 12.I.1672. He may be the Jean Poupart who married, in Longué 10.VII.1657, a Perrine Boux.


