RICHARDSON, Alice, Mrs Benjamin Roberts

fl. London 1769-77

Exhibited pastels at the Society of Artists from 1769 to 1775; various London addresses were given (11 Salisbury Court, 1769; Mr Wells's, Piccadilly 1770; Mr Trentham's, 52 Strand, 1770; Mr Turner's, Masham Street, 1772-74; 21 Tottenham Street, 1775). In 1776 she sent three pastels to the Royal Academy from 4 College Street, Westminster, the same address as is given by a "Miss Alice Roberts" in a submission to the Society of Artists in 1777. Despite the logic of the honorific titles given, these were one and the same person: on 30.XII.1776 at St John's Smith Square, Alice Richardson, widow, was married to a Benjamin Roberts, bachelor (Faculty Office marriage licence granted 28.XII.1776). One of the witnesses, Charles Thomas Carter, was probably the Irish composer;a week later, on 6.1.1777, he married a Susan Williamson Giles (from Kimbolton, Huntingtonshire) at St Margaret's Westminster, with Alice and Benjamin Roberts reciprocating as witnesses). Perhaps she had theatrical connections, but Alice Richardson's maiden name and dates remain to be discovered-unless (a suggestion based only on the similarities of the signature) she is the Alice Williams who married a Charles Richardson at St Mary Bothaw, St Swithin's Lane, 29.VIII.1768: among the witnesses was Peter Lewis de La Rive, a broker at Angel Court from an important family in Geneva, naturalised by act of parliament.
