SCOTT, A. Grenville

fl. 1779

A signed pastel, one of numerous copies of Rembrandt's famous painting, bears a date (disputed as either 1774 or more probably 1779) which suggests a terminus ante quem for the painting's arrival in Britain. The painting had previously belonged to Roger de Piles, Blondel de Gagny and J.-B.-P. Le Brun. As the author of the 1993 catalogue entry noted, nothing is known about the copyist; but one may conjecture that there was a connection with the owner: the 6th Lord Polwarth's sister was Anne Scott of Harden (1755-1819sa), of Woodside House, Kelso, but no middle name is recorded (although her father, an MP, was a supporter of prime minister Grenville, whose family might conceivably have furnished a godparent). She is briefly mentioned in London by Mrs Delany.
