The pastellist signing C. Sykes in 1779, and working in a style very similar to that of Lewis Vaslet (*q.v.*), may also be responsible for two other examples. The name is spelt Sikes on the engraving after one portrait. He is possibly related to the John Sykes (1781–1837) who published *Local records* in Newcastle upon Tyne in 1824 in which the Emerson pastel is mentioned (in the third person). No connection with other homonyms (*v. s.v.* Francis Sykes) has been established.
