TOTT, Sophie-Ernestine de

Constantinople 1758 – c.1840

Referred to as “Countess Totte” by Sée, the artist of the pastel of Elfi Bey must be the French émigrée artist Sophie de Tott, daughter of François, baron de Tott (1733–1793), a consul in Constantinople of Hungarian extraction, and an amateur painter and musician. Although never married, she was a chanoinesse and thus entitled to be called Madame de Tott as she is usually referred to. She was effectively adopted by Mme de Tessé, aunt of the marquise de Lafayette. Her sister married François, duc de La Rochefoucauld. She was the subject of a portrait by Vigée Le Brun and the friend of Thomas Jefferson, with whom she exchanged letters on J.-G. Drouais's *Marius prisonnier à Minturnae* (1786). A miniature of Sophie painting the portrait of the comtesse de Tessé (Washington 1977, no. 229 repr.) has been attributed to her father; perhaps it is a self-portrait. She emigrated during the Revolution, and exhibited a number of portraits in unspecified media at the Royal Academy between 1801 and 1804. In 1807 she was part of the retinue of Elizabeth Berkeley, Margravine of Anspach. In 1825, back in France, she made a copy of a portrait of the prince de Condé.
