VALDENUIT, Thomas Bluget de

Les Riceys 21.XI.1763–9.XI.1846
Exiled French soldier, active in New York (where he arrived c.1793 from Guadaloupe) as printmaker and draughtsman and partner of Saint-Mémin (*q.v.*), to whom Valdenuit drawings are often attributed, perhaps because they use pink prepared paper. The few examples known from photographs appear to be in black and white chalk rather than pastel, despite the recorded descriptions. He returned to his native town, and was préfet de la Lozère 1821–28. An altarpiece in the parish church at Les Riceys (Aube) was erected by his family "en souvenir de M. Thomas Bluget de Valdenuit, né et mort à Ricey, ancien préfet de l'Empire".
