VOLAIRE, Jacques-Antoine, chevalier

Toulon 30.IV.1729 – Naples 19.IX.1799

Jacques-Antoine (as he often signed), or Pierre-Jacques (as he appears on his baptismal record), Volaire, or Volère, trained in the family workshop in Toulon, set up by his father – a painter originally from Nantes, believed to be Jacques-Auguste Volaire (1685–1768). After working as an assistant to Joseph Vernet, who came to Toulon in 1754 to paint the ports of France, Volaire travelled to Rome around 1763, becoming a member of the Accademia di San Luca. He specialised in landscapes and, after his move to Naples in 1767, in views of Vesuvius. The popularity of his nocturnal pictures was no doubt enhanced by the eruption of 1771. Among the confusions about this artist are the two *Marines*, medium unspecified, offered for sale at the Salon de Toulouse in 1752, which Mesuret suggests may be the pastels at Agen; if so they may be by the father.
