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WOLCOT, John

Dodbrooke, Devon bpt 9.V.1738 – London 14.I.1819

The Rev. John Wolcot, MD, was a satirist, poet and critic, known under the name Peter Pindar. He was born near Kingsbridge, Devon, and educated there and in France before being apprenticed to his uncle, a surgeon. In 1768 he travelled with Sir William Trelawney to Jamaica where he was appointed physician-general and ordained in the same year. He returned to England in 1773, practising as a physician in Cornwall where he discovered the Cornish artist John Opie (q.v.). Wolcot took his protégé to London. He was also portrayed in pastel by Humphry (q.v.) in 1783 and by J. R. Smith (q.v.) in 1801. Wolcot himself was an amateur landscape artist, occasionally working in pastel, and his lessons were given chiefly in this medium. A portrait of Dr Monsey has more curiosity than aesthetic value. In a codicil to his will of .VIII.1812 (Cornwall Record Office, TF/3504), Wolcot left to Wm Shield of Berners Street "any three of my crayons which are framed", and the same to Wm Snosswell.
